8	Inversion of Yield Curve	The yield on long-term Treasury bonds falls below the yield on short-term bonds , historically a strong recessionary signal.
9	Widespread Rating Downgrades	Credit rating agencies or analysts issue mass downgrades for companies or sectors, citing fundamental weaknesses.
10	Margin Debt Contraction	A significant and sudden reduction in the amount of money investors are borrowing on margin to buy stocks.
11	MACD Cross-Over (Daily/Weekly)	The Moving Average Convergence Divergence indicator shows a bearish cross-over on longer time frames (Daily or Weekly chart).

Profit-Taking Indicators (Normal Market Fluctuation)

These indicators suggest a healthy, temporary pullback, often due to traders "locking in" gains after a strong run.

#	Indicator	What it Suggests
12	Concentrated Selling	Selling is isolated to a few sectors, the most recent market leaders (e.g., Tech stocks), or individual high-flyers.
13	Lower/Moderate Volume	The decline occurs on lower or only moderately elevated trading volume, indicating a lack of broad conviction from sellers.

18	Gap Fill	The selling simply fills a recent price gap created during the rally, a common technical occurrence.
19	Options Market Skew	The options market (put/call ratio) shows a return to normal or slightly higher call volume after a period of intense buying.
20	Bullish Chart Patterns Remain	Longer-term bullish patterns (e.g., higher highs and higher lows) on weekly charts are still intact .
21	Liquidity Cycle	Occurs predictably at month-end or quarter-end as funds rebalance their portfolios after a strong performance.
22	Small or Mid-Cap Strength	While the major indices drop, smaller or mid-cap stocks (often less correlated with tech leaders) show relative strength or bounce back quickly.

1. AI Sell-Off Despite Strong Earnings (The Main Factor):

- **Nvidia (NVDA):** After closing hours on Wednesday, Nvidia reported blockbuster earnings and guidance that initially sparked a rally in Asian, European, and US futures.⁴ However, the stock reversed its early 5% gain to close **down 3.2%**, fueling the broader market decline as investor concerns about the sustainability and valuation of the AI boom returned.⁵

2. Mixed Economic Data:

- **Jobs Report:** Delayed September jobs data showed stronger-than-expected job growth, which initially supported the market but did little to

change expectations that the Federal Reserve will likely **hold interest rates steady** at their next meeting.⁸

3. Standout Gainers:

- **Walmart (WMT):** Rallied significantly (around 6.5%) after reporting strong quarterly results and raising its full-year outlook, suggesting consumer strength in discount/retail sectors.⁹
- **Healthcare:** Select stocks like Regeneron Pharmaceuticals and PACS Group posted strong gains on positive news (FDA approval and earnings, respectively).¹⁰

Global Market Context

In contrast to the US reversal, European and Asian markets, which traded earlier, generally closed higher, capitalizing on the initial optimism from the Nvidia results and easing fears:

- **Europe:** Germany's DAX and the UK's FTSE 100 closed modestly higher.¹¹
- **Asia:** Japan's Nikkei 225 surged significantly, gaining over 2.6%.¹²

In short, November 20th was a day defined by **extreme risk-off behavior** in the US, with a massive midday reversal that hammered the high-momentum AI and technology stocks.
