- Bullhorn: overt messaging that provokes polarization
- Dog whistle: coded message recognizable to a subgroup

Such frameworks describe tendencies, not diagnoses.

- Psychopathy (low empathy, impulsive aggression)
- Machiavellianism (strategic manipulation)
- Narcissism (need for admiration, dominance)

Political psychologists sometimes analyze behavior using:
