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The Penske 12 foot rental, what is the truck make and model? I once drove a Yukon 2002, similar?

Penske's 12-foot rental box trucks aren't built on a single proprietary blueprint. Instead, Penske buys commercial "cutaway" or "stripped" chassis directly from major automakers and outfits them with a custom cargo box.

If you rent a 12-footer today, you will almost certainly get one of two core models:

- **GMC Savana 3500 (or Chevy Express 3500 companion):** This is the exact truck pictured below. Look closely at the front grille, and you will spot the distinct red GMC lettering.
- **Ford E-350 Super Duty:** The classic Econoline cutaway cab that has anchored rental fleets for decades.

Is it similar to a 2002 GMC Yukon?

Yes, the underlying DNA is incredibly similar, though the driving experience scales up.

Because your 2002 Yukon was built on GM's **GMT800** full-size truck platform, it shared major engineering architecture, engine families (the legendary Vortec V8s), and dashboard switchgear with the GMC Savana vans of that same era.

If you step into a GMC-chassis Penske rental today, a few elements will feel instantly familiar, along with some major upgrades:

- **The Powertrain:** Like your Yukon, these trucks rely on a massive, naturally aspirated GM V8 (modern versions feature the 6.6L V8) paired with a heavy-

duty automatic transmission. The low-end torque delivery and mechanical grunt will feel deeply familiar.

- **The Ergonomics:** The seating position, wide floor console layout, and commanding view over a short, sloping hood mirror the traditional full-size GM truck experience.
- **The Key Differences:** A 12-foot box truck has a Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) pushing up to 9,900 lbs. It features a wider rear track, stiffer commercial leaf-spring suspension to handle a 3,100 lb payload, and zero center-rearview visibility (you will be relying strictly on your massive dual-faced side mirrors).

If you could comfortably place a 2002 Yukon into a tight parking spot, you have already mastered the spatial awareness needed for this box truck. You just have to remember to account for the extra vertical clearance (6 feet 1 inch inside the box, roughly 11 feet total road clearance) and wide tail-swing when making sharp turns.

Why Penske Blocked One-Way Cargo Van Rentals

Penske updated its national fleet strategy: **the high-roof cargo van is now strictly limited to local, round-trip rentals.**

If you attempt to book a one-way trip (like New York to Florida), the platform will automatically filter it out or label it unavailable. Fleet managers generally rely on two primary metrics for these choices:

1. **Fleet Rebalancing Costs:** Cargo vans are highly coveted by local commercial contractors, delivery drivers, and small business DIYers. When these vans get scattered cross-country via one-way moves, it creates massive logistical deficits in major metropolitan hubs. Rebalancing them via transport carriers eats deep into profit margins.
2. **Channeling to the 12-Foot Box Truck:** Penske intentionally funnels one-way, low-volume movers directly into their **12-foot box trucks**. The 12-foot model features a heavier commercial chassis designed specifically to handle long-

haul, interstate wear and tear, and it comes with unlimited mileage for one-way contracts.

Alternative One-Way Cargo Van Options

If you strictly want a transit-style van without stepping up to a box truck, a few major competitors still support one-way long-distance van routing:

- **U-Haul (GMC Savana / Ford Transit Cargo Vans):** U-Haul maintains the largest, most decentralized fleet in North America. They do allow one-way cargo van rentals, though they do not offer the "unlimited mileage" perks that Penske applies to box trucks. You will be charged a flat rate that includes a set mileage allowance based on your direct route, plus a per-mile fee if you exceed it.
- **Budget Truck Rental (Ford Transit Cargo Vans):** Budget routinely permits point-to-point, one-way cargo van moves. Because Budget shares logistics infrastructure with its parent company (Avis Budget Group), they are highly efficient at absorbing vans into mixed car/truck return lots across Florida.
- **Enterprise Truck Rental:** Enterprise treats cargo vans as standard commercial assets. If you book through *Enterprise Truck Rental* (rather than the standard consumer car rental arm), you can often secure a one-way high-roof Ford Transit or Ram ProMaster. However, one-way availability fluctuates heavily based on seasonal corporate demand, and dropping a commercial truck at a standard airport car lot usually triggers steep penalties.

If your cargo is small enough to fit a van, it is always worth quoting a **12-foot Penske box truck** side-by-side with a **U-Haul Cargo Van**. Because Penske includes free unlimited mileage on their one-way box trucks, the total cost for a long-distance run down the East Coast often ends up significantly cheaper than paying a competitor's per-mile cargo van rates.

1. Penske Truck Rental (The Gold Standard for Long Hauls)

Penske focuses on operational efficiency. Because they run a massive commercial logistics operation alongside consumer rentals, their trucks are kept on strict maintenance intervals.
